IAHM Hosts Presentations During Asian Pacific Heritage Month

With May being Asian Pacific Heritage Month, IAHM's popular Ethnic Dialogue sessions were in even greater demand than usual. Through the personal stories of volunteers, this cultural outreach program offers an orientation to the Asian Indian community and sets the context for an exploration of the business district on Devon Avenue.

IAHM volunteers Dorothie Shah, Nafisa and Mannan Bandukwala, Rima Mukherjee, Basanti Banerji, Rani Desai, Shailja Khatriand, Lakshmi Menon shared information about the community with visiting groups ranging from third graders to university students. Some were from schools within IAHM's neighborhood, while others came from the suburbs and even as far away as Michigan.

Upcoming sessions include a collaboration with the Swedish American Museum of Chicago summer camp, and a teacher workshop for 20-30 K-8 Chicago Public School teachers who are interested in integrating knowledge of the

South Asian world into their teaching of general subjects.

On May 15, the Indo-American Heritage Museum hosted a presentation about the "Gateway to India" tour for the Chicago Cultural Alliance and other ethnic museums to share its experience in developing this innovative project. Board members Lakshmi Menon and Dorothie Shah led a

discussion on the tour, which was developed through long-term collaboration with the CCA and Burnham 100 Celebration. The purpose of the presentation was to introduce CCA's core partner museums and institutions to the project, while offering IAHM's tour model as a guide to constructively showcase cultural neighborhoods. The agenda concluded with an orientation to the ethnic community and a tour of the Asian Indian commercial district on Devon Avenue, followed by lunch at the Indian Garden restaurant for participants.

Upcoming Events: Summer 2010 Calendar

This summer, the Indo-American Heritage Museum is excited to cooperate with the Chicago Cultural Alliance in a series of groundbreaking projects focusing on themes of community, cross-cultural dialogue and climate change.

The "Talking About.... Dialogues" program is a two-part series of public panel sessions in which members of Chicago's ethnic communities are invited to discuss significant contemporary issues through the lens of their cultural heritage and experiences. For the first part of this project, IAHM will work in close partnership with the Cambodian American Heritage Museum (CAHM) to organize a cross-cultural dialogue on the subject of Identity, a theme inspired by the Field Museum's current exhibit which explores the question "How do we identify ourselves?" The discussion will bring together diverse voices from each community and involve approximately sixty volunteers from both organizations. This landmark event will be held at the Field Museum on July 10, 2010 between 9-11 am. For additional information on Kip Fulbeck and the HAPA project,

The Internal Community Dialogue program is the second half of the "Talking About..." series and aims to provide better insight into the immigration stories of distinct ethnic communities. IAHM, along with CCA's other core museums, will host individual dialogue sessions with an inter-generational group of community participants, who will share and critically discuss their perspectives on the experience of immigration. This fascinating event will take place on August 1, 2010; please check future news items

"Telling Our Stories: Environmentally Friendly Communities" is a program initiative developed between the Chicago Cultural Alliance and the Division of Environment, Culture and Conservation (ECCo) at the Field Museum, a primary partner institution of CCA. As part of the project, IAHM and other core ethnic museums 'will elicit community narratives about heritage-related values and practices that can be revived, reinvented, validated, and encouraged to help communities become more sustainable.'

In fulfilling this objective, IAHM board members and volunteers will engage in multiple workshops to develop a portrait of their ethnic community's contributions in shaping a uniquely cultural approach to eco-friendly action. This includes brainstorming activities to encourage awareness and long-term change in the community, as well as suggestions to promote innovative business practices on Devon Ave, such as finding a substitute for paper plates in local restaurants by adopting the tradition of eating on banana leaves, or encouraging the use of reusable shopping bags in grocery stores.
